Split 10-13 October 2018

At lunchtime in Split on Wednesday, 13th October, The Master, Upper Warden and Clerk welcomed those who had arrived that morning after a very early start and the advance parties who had arrived in a more leisurely fashion by land, sea and air the day before, or even before then.



We embarked on an orientation, induction tour around the City with our very knowledgeable Aussie Croat Guide called Ante. Split has a long seafront harbour, clearly marking one edge of its bustling centre. Three periods of development were explored in chronological order. Hence, we started at the Diocletian Palace, built by the Romans in the 3rd Century, followed by the Venetian quarter which is mainly 14th/15th Century and the Baroque period sector built in 18th century. All seemed to blend it seamlessly with a myriad of narrow

streets and we enjoyed the real flavour of this very attractive, clean City.

In the evening, following the Master's welcome drink on the roof top bar with a fantastic view of Split and the mountains behind the City, we repaired to the Luxor restaurant located in the centre of Diocletian's Palace. An excellent meal was followed by an entertainer playing guitar in the Roman columned precincts, in his repertoire was John Lennon's 'Imagine' which demonstrated the remarkable acoustics of his surroundings.

Thursday began with the Fletchers let loose on the streets of Split, one group heading for the beach whilst others meandered through the inter-

esting markets and narrow streets. Some visited the mausoleum, converted into a cathedral, where the more adventurous climbed the bell tower for a spectacular view of the old town.

In the afternoon we assembled en masse for the coach trip. On the way to the coastal town of Trogir (of UNESCO fame), we stopped at Salona (an abandoned roman town) to view the ruined Roman Amphitheatre. Opinions were mixed as to whether it was impressive as many of

the original components had been recycled into other

buildings.

With continuing stunning weather, Trogir was at its best. It boasts narrow alleyways and small piazzas with period limestone buildings, all beautifully maintained. The town is very compact being built on a small island. Following our tour around the town, many Fletchers poured into one or more of the many lovely bars with fine views of the water and boats. We remained in Trogit for dinner in a splendid restaurant where we enjoyed typical Dalmatian dishes, such as cuttlefish risotto, whilst being serenaded by a fiveman choir and mandolin.





The early start on Friday (8.30am) was too much for some however, the majority walked to the Ferry Terminal for the boat trip to Brac. With beautiful blue sea and sky, the crossing passed quickly, and we disembarked on the island for a coach trip around the perimeter. Our first stop was at a school for stone masons, where we had an interesting talk about working with the local limestone. The young apprentices displayed great skill with hand tools, working on pillars, coats of arms etc. On to lunch at a mountain restaurant. This had memorable views across the sea to the mainland with Split clearly visible some 15 miles away against a backdrop

of mountains. The entertainment was provided by a two man band whose repertoire included O Sole Mio, Que será, será, and Stand by Me. As a result of the Fletcher participation with the band, consideration is being given to the creation of a Fletchers' Choir – working name 'Cat's Chorus'!

And so, to the 'last supper', which was a Japanese feast of many courses where the gluttonous Diocletian would have felt at home! The meal was followed by a heartfelt address from Chris Brown, who has attended all 23 of The Masters' Holidays, and spoke warmly of his experiences and thanked those who had made such a success of this tour.

The final day dawned, glorious again, and the party set out by coach for the part of Croatia most affected in the 'Balkans' War' of the 90s. We visited the front-line village, Čavoglave,

where the Serb attack was halted. This was marked by an old Serb tank that had been captured by the Croats. Our next stop was a panoramic view of a 15th century Franciscan Monastery located in the middle of

Visovac Lake, itself part of Krka national park. By then, it was time for lunch at 'Drago's Camp', a small family home, dating back to the 15th Century. Drago's mother had steadfastly refused to leave during the Serbian occupation and endured three years of house arrest. She remarked that not all the Serbian soldiers were bad, some even gave her food to eat!! Drago's main occupation is the production of Prosciutto Ham of award-winning quality where the product is dried naturally by the Bura and Yugo winds that sweep through the area. Drago does not speak any English but, nonetheless, entertained us for a memorable and delicious lunch assist-





ed by many members of his family. All the ingredients came from his small holding, including some rather good cherry and walnut brandy. The prosciutto was outstanding. The hastily arranged Fletchers' Choir joined the regular entertainers in a rendering of John Denver's 'Take me home country roads' before serenading the family with Laudi Spirituali. Much fun was had by all before, all too soon, the party had to head for home via the airport and the charming town of Sibenik.

Split was a perfect destination for a Master's Holiday. The hotel was located at the very edge of the old town in a traffic

free zone within easy reach of all principal attractions, sea views, port and restaurants. The narrow streets and historic buildings contributed to the stress free atmosphere. The light management touch permitted much free time and flexibility for those who preferred to 'cherry pick' their outings. The guide was articulate, well informed and cheerful. So, all in all, a triumph for the Master, June and Clerk. A memorable few days, which they also appeared to enjoy.

The Fletcher's Disability Championship Lilleshall 23rd – 24th June 2018



On a very hot weekend in June, Fletchers and their wives supported the second Fletcher's Disability Championship at Lilleshall, the home of AGB and where all elite or "on the pathway" train. The Worshipful Company of Fletchers sponsor this unique event which is now a world record status competition whereby the archers can gain scores to be used in part of the selection process for international competitions.

After last year's success it was not surprising that there were 25% more athletes taking part this year including a large novice competition for any archer with a physical impairment who has been shooting for less than two years and, particularly gratifying, a large contingent of visually impaired archers. The

Trust is aware that VI archers have found it difficult to establish themselves in archery not just in terms of logistics but also the cost involved in includ-

Melanie Clarke – Freeman Archer

Mel has been a friend of the Fletchers for some time and is a Freeman Archer. She is a medal winning Paralympian and has won more golds, silver and bronzes in the World and European Championships. She and her partner Richard Hennahane were our guests at our dinner following last years Fletcher's Disability Championships - an evening of great fun. It must take incredible dedication and guts to go through Mel's surgery but it has obviously worked. Here is Mel's story in her own words.

Michael Holden

What a difference a year can make! On 24th June 2018, I became the 'Ladies Compound Champion' at the Worshipful Company of Fletchers Disability Championships. I was so proud to sit on the podium - and even more so as only one year before that - at the 2017 Championships I was recovering from major surgery and wasn't sure if I would be able to compete again!

I began having issues with the wrist in 2015, and over the next 2 years had 5 surgeries to try to fix the pain and inflammation I was having. Unfortunately, these didn't do the trick, and so in June of 2017 I took a huge risk, and had a major operation as my 'last chance solution'. At this point, despite much research and consideration, the surgeon, myself and the GB team at Lilleshall were unsure whether this would work - let alone allow me to shoot again in the future. In my mind it was definitely worth the risk and so I (luckily under anaesthetic!) had 16 fractures put into my arm, 4 ligaments and tendons cut and moved, and a 8 inch metal bar screwed into my arm to permanently fuse it solid and straight.... and yes - it was as painful as that sounds!

That pretty much 'took me out' for the next 6 months recovering, but I had great fun watching and supporting the Disability Championships in August 2017. Watching from the balcony with team mates gave us an amazing view of the finals day, and it was great to catch up once more with team mates and fellow Fletchers too!

Sunday afternoon hosted a 'Fletchers Friendly Shoot', and I had been asked to compete as a Fletcher in this event. Unfortunately, still being in a plaster cast didn't make this possible, and so my partner (and Paralympian from 2012) Richard Hennahane was volunteered to take my place -after coming out of his 3 year competitive retirement! For the competition, there were some warm up shots in Sutherland Hall, then teams were chosen - with a Fletcher and a GB Archer on each team, to compete over 18 meters, in 'head to head style' matches. After the Fletchers had selected their partners, John Cavanagh and Richard were remaining, and so were paired up. After the first round however, and with a near perfect score between them, this team was disqualified by the judges for having "Too much Paralympic experience between them!!" to much amusement of all the spectators and other competitors! The tournament continued, and crowned the worthy winners, though not before a single arrow sudden death' type tournament was hosted, between the leaders and JC and Rich took place. Even with 6 Paralympic Games between them, JC and Rich were beaten!!

AGINCOURT MUGS

Special Price to clear remaining Stock



We still have a few of these attractive mugs left. They commemorate the 600th anniversary of the battle and were produced in a strictly limited edition of 600, the Mug has the Coat of Arms of the Fletchers Company on one side and those of Agincourt with the Agincourt 600 badge on the other. There are also three arrows on the inside of the Mug and a brief history of the Fletchers' Company on the base. Proceeds from the sale will go to the Fletchers' Charitable Trust, which principally supports Archery for the Disabled, from grass roots up to

support for Paralympic archery.

Each mug, which is 3½ inches (90mm) high, comes with a numbered certificate signed by the Master Fletcher.

The price or a single mug is £20 but to clear the few remaining, we are offering a set of 4 for £40. Both prices include post and packing.

After this, I was even more motivated to heal quickly, with the goal to be able to compete in 12 months time at this shoot..... So I worked really hard on recovery and rehab, and in November of 2017 I was given the 'all clear' to once more pick up my bow.

It was a long, slow, hard slog back - and I had to learn a new technique - drawing the bow with my elbow to allow me to shoot again -but it worked - and just 13 months after my surgery I was competing at this years' Championships. In some 'not so ideal' weather, I qualified first during the ranking round - and it was incredible to see so many archers with disabilities on the field - with Para, classified, non classified, experienced and new athletes all competing together.

Finals day came on the Sunday, and I had made it through to the gold medal match. After some friendly advice to a very new athlete shooting in the bronze medal match - in her very first head to head match shot in this format about 'how it all worked', I sat waiting to compete.

I was nervous to compete with the commentary, live streaming and crowd once more - especially after not doing so since 2015 - but I pulled on my experiences and shot well against Jodie Grin-

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ham. It was a close match, and after 12 arrows we were tied - yet I shot well with my last three arrows to become the 2018 Champion!

The Worshipful Company of Fletchers Disability Championships is an incredible shoot - to allow such a range of athletes the opportunity to compete together if fantastic - and once again I thank the Fletchers for their organisation of this, and their support of the GB Paralympic Team over many, many years.

So - that's the kind of difference a year can make - and what about the next 12 months.... Well, it's all looking very exciting. I've been shooting really well, and our World Champs are next year where I hope to win a space for the Tokyo Paralympics in 2020. But life is amazing - and changing - and next year I am getting married to my fiancée Richard, and we are expecting a baby just after Christmas too.... so life will keep us busy.... but I still hope to return to the Disability Champs in 2019 to defend my title!!.....
