Fletchers' Trust Agincourt 600 Essay Competition

To mark the end of our year commemorating the 600th anniversary of the Battle of Agin-court and to build links with the City of London schools and academies, the Fletchers' Trust sponsored an essay competition with the winner to be invited to the Agincourt 600 Farewell Dinner at Cutlers' Hall on 11 April 2016 in the presence of HRH Princess Michael of Kent.



However this was a multi-layered event!! The original invitations to school and academy heads were delivered with a batch of Agincourt 600 Fletcher mugs to be used internally as an encouragement for participants. In the case of City of London Academy Islington these are to be used within "our own" Fletcher House (one of five houses named after city livery companies). The competition was aimed at pupils in year 10 (ie 15 year olds in the year before their GCSE exams) and asked them to tackle the topic of "Why has the Battle of Agincourt resonated through English and British history for the last 600 years and why does it have relevance today?" in just 1000 words.

From the outset we were grateful for the support of Fletcher, Anne Curry, Professor of Medieval History at Southampton University who agreed to mark the entries and also helped with some guidance notes on how to focus on a narrow theme within a potentially very wide remit. On the final day for entries the marking began and we were delighted with the originality of approaches and the overall quality of entries as we were well aware that this is not a period of history that gets much coverage in schools these days. Anne wrote individual feedback and these comments were incorporated into a personal letter of thanks and congratulation from the Master for each entrant.

Out of this we also had a worthy winner, Charlotte Blythe from the City of London Freemen's School. Charlotte joined us for the Agincourt 600 Dinner, received a prize arrow from the Master as a memento and also a donation to the school's nominated charity (Woodlands School for disabled children in Leatherhead). In recognition of the strong team performance from the City of London School for Girls we also gave a donation to their charity which, this year, is Streetchild.

With thanks to the schools and their pupils who entered; to Adrian Scott Knight, Andrew Trapnell and Andrew McMillan, whose financial support made this possible, and to Anne Curry for all her hard work.


ers final installment towards the Paralympic Archery Team.





As in previous years, the rest of the places were filled with local able bodied archers. Overall 77 archers took part.



The para archers travelled to the venue from all over the country, with one couple coming all the way from Newcastle! The profit that was made by the event will be ploughed back into our inclusion club and has already been earmarked for coaching and adapted equipment. The event was well received by those taking part and all archers were also asked to complete a small survey in order to inform how we can make the event even better next year.

The survey also shows that over 70% of the participants felt that there were not enough truly inclusive tournaments, which supports the decision to continue to run such an event.
