Each year at the April Court Meeting, our Livery installs a new Master and so at our Court Meeting on Tuesday 17<sup>th</sup> April, Clare James handed over the Master's Chain and Badge of Office to Dr Roger Watson and, with the approval of the Court, declared him to be the Master for the ensuing year.

The handover in the Worshipful Company of Fletchers takes place privately in the Court Meeting and the incoming Master declares he or she will carry out the duties to the best of their ability and signs the Master's Statement in the ledger. Dear Michael,

Just a few lines that you may want to use for your magazine.

When I was knocked from my motorcycle on the M60 in 2004, I lost a few things. The least of which was my left leg. Anyone would think that spending 3 months in hospital and the next year learning to walk on a prosthetic leg would be the big part of the story. It wasn't. The most life changing thing was that I lost a sense of self and a sense of purpose in my life.

I could no longer run the 10k races I loved so much. No more mountain biking. No dog walking with my husband and our new puppy. The job I enjoyed so much was all but closed to me and the people I'd considered close friends could no longer hold eye contact with me. Desperate to enjoy a sport once more, I turned to Archery. It took me a while to take it seriously, but when the bug bit, it bit hard.

I tried out for the Great British Paralympic training squad and was accepted within weeks as a member of the team. I couldn't believe it! I'd found something to get excited about again. My equipment was very basic, club level and with no spares. My arrows were old and a little bent out of shape but that's all I could afford at the time.

This is where **YOU** came into my story. The Worshipful Company of Fletchers helped me to buy a new bow that was Olympic standard and 2 sets of arrows to match. You will never be able to understand what this means to people in my position.

To be taken seriously as an athlete and be given such a firm helping hand is more than just equipment. It's the glow that someone thinks you are worth helping. It's the feeling that people believe in you. It's having that sense of purpose back. Thank you Fletchers, You're all wonderful

#### **AGINCOURT MUGS**

#### **Special Price to clear remaining Stock**



We still have a few of these attractive mugs left. They commemorate the 600<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the battle and were produced in a strictly limited edition of 600, the Mug has the Coat of Arms of the Fletchers Company on one side and those of Agincourt with the Agincourt 600 badge on the other. There are also three arrows on the inside of the Mug and a brief history of the Fletchers' Company on the base. Proceeds from the sale will go to the Fletchers' Charitable Trust, which principally supports Archery for the Disabled, from grass roots up to support

for Paralympic archery.

Each mug which is 3½ inches (90mm) high and comes with a numbered certificate signed by the Master Fletcher.

The price or a single mug is £20 but to clear the few remaining, we are offering a set of 4 for £40. Both prices include post and packing.

- sponsored the VI National Indoor Championships as well as supporting Blind veterans and Metro Blind Sports Archery;
- hosting the Fletchers Day for Archers with Disability at the Royal Toxophilite Society, as well as making the first payment to Archery GB for Tokyo 2020.

#### 3) supporting our Military and Educational affiliates, by:

- providing prizes for the affiliated schools, (City of London Academies at Southwark and Islington and the Freemen's School in Ashtead);
- awarding a small cash sum together with a perpetual prize arrow to members of all three of our military affiliations in recognition of individual excellence;
- supporting some City institutions, such as the Sheriffs' and Recorder's Fund, the Sons of the Clergy, the City of London Police Widows and Orphans Fund, as well as the Lord Mayor's Appeal;
- supporting an apprentice at Mudchute Park and Farm, a new venture for the Trust.

Mudchute deserves a special mention. It comprises 32 acres of land on the Isle of Dogs saved as a green space in 1977 by the efforts of local people. It provides children's services of a high quality involving 130 young people as volunteers and for work experience. There is also an educational project which last year reached over 12,000 pupils from 32 schools. The farm contains both common and rare farm animals in a green space rare in the inner city available to those who might otherwise not have ready access to the country. 700 volunteers have been involved in keeping the open areas spruce.

The Mudchute charity does earn fees from its educational and children's services and receives some, though diminishing, local authority support; however, it does need private and corporate donations to continue. Members of the committee have visited the Farm on more than one occasion and have been impressed by the energy and competence of those involved. Two years ago, the Trust identified a project it wished to support. Mudchute takes on 3 apprentices, each for two years on the minimum wage; they select those who would not otherwise have a chance of obtaining a worthwhile job and by the discipline of training, gives them the experience and confidence to seek employment elsewhere. In this they have been successful. The approximate cost per apprentice is £8000 per annum and The Fletchers' Trust has given £2000 in each of the last two years and the most recent Charity Committee meeting, it was agreed to increase this to £4000 for each of the next two years. Members of the Committee will be visiting the Farm again in the summer to be brought up to date.
