Moments before their arrival the drilling began, followed by a huge articulated lorry turning into Cloth Street. Your Clerk tackled the lorry, persuading the driver to hold off for a few minutes, whilst Master Farmer stopped the drilling. The sound of hoofs was heard, and the ensemble turned into Cloth Street.

The Master had to attend a funeral that day, and was kindly represented by Stuart Robbens, our Upper Warden and the Clerk together with Rosie Carne, Master Farmer and her Clerk, Graham Bamford who greeted the riders and their





"shanks pony" supporters. The walkers, one of whom was Past Master Andrew McMillan accompanied the horses along the route shaking buckets. A brief photo call and chat and they were off to visit further Halls on their return to Warwick Square.

At lunch at the Old Bailey, both Sheriff's commented on how much they had enjoyed the ride, it possibly surpassed their other duties in the year in terms of enjoyment, and it transpired that a man in a white van had popped £20 into one of the buckets – he was an ex prisoner, now gainfully employed.

The following day in thanking their supporters they wrote We were lucky that it was dry (and not too warm) – pleased to report that we're walking okay this morning! Having so many people helping collect on the day made a huge difference and created a great atmosphere. We Hope you enjoyed it as much as we did – we're still buzzing!

And they raised some £6,200 for the fund.

Natalie is Ann Spain's daughter and a senior civil servant, and Michele is the wife of a Constructors' Past Master and has been involved in making arrangements for his Past Masters association following a career as an electrologist.

Helen George, who has been involved with and promoted and developed archery for the disabled for many years was made an Honorary Freeman of the Company.

After a brief break to turn the Freemans Room where the Court meeting was held around, some 36 Liverymen and their guests enjoyed some sparkling rose before going into lunch in the Georgian elegance of the Watermen's Company Hall. Salmon with asparagus, followed by baked Atlantic cod in a sorrel sauce with summer vegetables was served, before a sumptuous soft fruit crème brûlée and blackcurrant sorbet.

Bowyers versus Fletchers The Tower Shoot 25th June 2019



Bowyers' and Fletchers' gathered in the east moat of Her Majesty's Tower for our annual shooting contest. Ably assisted by volunteers from the London Archers, a few practice arrows were loosed and then then it was every arrow to count - the competition was on! Moreover, this time it was a "barebow" competition – no sights on the bow to help with the aim – was this a cunning ploy by a Bowyer to gain advantage? The Pimm's team did a sterling job, and despite the influence some stronger mixes most arrows landed on the targets or very close to them!

We were joined in the Moat by Colonel James Denny and Lieutenant Colonel Jez Lamb from the Fusiliers, and Debbie Whittingham, the Deputy Governor and head of security and operations at the Tower; who also joined us for supper.

The Companies repaired to the Fusiliers' Mess for an enjoyable buffet supper, with choices of Salmon en Croute, a Guinea Fowl Chasseur or Pork Fillet with apples served in a cider sauce. Individual pavlovas, profiterole or a honey and

yogurt cheesecake followed.

All went quiet when the Deputy Governor stood up to announce the winner of the Governor's Trophy, a small wooden box said to be a replica of the arrow box in which Anne Boleyn was buried. The competition is always hard fought if friendly, and since the Fletchers' had won the Trophy in 2017 and 2018, we hoped for a hat trick; and this year the scores were especially close, with only one mark's difference in the two Company's scores: 213 to the Bowyers' and 214 to the Fletchers'! The highest scoring guest was Tony Ward a member of the Gunmakers' Company with 26 but the highest individual score of 27 out of a possible

30, went to Past Master Chris Brown, which undoubtedly contributed to our win.

After the prize giving and speeches a Yeoman Warder joined us to give a brief on the Ceremony of the Keys, the traditional locking up of the Tower and has taken place every night without fail since at least 1555. The importance of securing this fortress for the night is still very relevant because although the monarch no longer resides at this Royal Palace, her Crown Jewels do! During the Second World War several bombs fell on the Tower and in September 1941 it is recorded that following a direct hit the ceremony was delayed by half an hour, but still went ahead. Many of the assembled Bowyers' and Fletchers' attended the ceremony on the 25th June, the Escort for the Keys that evening, being the Coldstream Guards.

Thanks to the Fletchers' Trust

My name is Helen Powell. I am 36 years old and I live in the North East of England. After a Skiing accident when I was 17, I developed Complex Regional Pain Syndrome: A degenerative,

neurological condition which causes me to experience intense, unrelenting pain in my right leg.

When I was younger, I was very sporty and active; frequently partaking in Horse-Riding, Hapkido (a Korean Martial Art), SCUBA diving and Skiing. After my accident, I found the immobility caused by my condition difficult to reconcile. As my condition is exacerbated by movement, I needed a sport that would quench my thirst for activity whilst limiting movement. After much searching, I found that Archery fit these criteria perfectly... I was hooked!

I first discovered archery in 2014 and since then, it has improved my quality of life dramatically. It makes me feel competitive and included again in the same way that Horse-Riding and Martial Arts did before my injury. I also found that the focus and mental discipline required in Archery creates a welcome distraction from my pain.

I was introduced to the British Wheelchair Archery Association (BWAA) by Helen George (an Hon. Freeman archer and AGB Para Coach), whom I met whilst competing in my County Championships back in 2015. Since then, my technique has gone from strength to strength.



With the aid of funding from the Fletchers, I have been able to aquire a high quality Spotting Scope that is both very powerful and very lightweight and compact. I had been struggling to find a way to view my arrows accurately at competitive distances due to the limits inherent to my disability. The more powerful scopes are usually larger and heavier and when attached to my chair, they become unstable, slip out of position easily and wobble around, thus aggravating my condition.

Receiving this funding has enriched my overall shooting experience immeasurably. It allows me to be more independent on the shooting line as I can see exactly what results my efforts are having in real time, giving me accurate feedback as I train. This has boosted my confidence greatly and will undoubtedly help me to achieve my full potential as an archer in the years to come. Thanks

They commemorate the 600th anniversary of the battle and were produced in a strictly limited edition of 600, the Mug has the Coat of Arms of the Fletchers Company on one side and those of Agincourt with the Agincourt 600 badge on the other. There are also three arrows on the inside of the Mug and a brief history of the Fletchers' Company on the base. Proceeds from the sale will go to the Fletchers' Charitable Trust, which principally supports Archery for the Disabled, from grass roots up to support for Paralympic archery.
